MINUTES OF APRIL 18, 2024 MEETING

On a motion by David Hoyle and second by Wes Seegars, the Minutes of the April 18, 2024 meeting was approved as presented in **EXHIBIT A**.

ADMINISTRATION

Jason Cottle, *Chief Financial Officer*, presented a status report in **EXHIBIT B** on the Wildlife Resources Commission General Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, and the Endowment Fund.

COMMITTEE MEETING REPORTS

Rules Committee Report – May 14, 2024 – Wes Seegars, Chair, reported the Rules Committee met for an out-of-cycle meeting on May 14, 2024 to review the 2025-2026 annual cycle rule proposals and the plan for readoption of several periodic review rules. First, Chiefs presented inland fish, land and water access, and wildlife management proposals for the 2025-2026 seasons. A new proposal, based on discussions from the April Commission meeting, to shift the turkey season one week later than the current season framework was presented and discussed. All proposals were approved to move forward for rulemaking in June. Next, the readoption plan for four 10G and 10J rules was presented. These rules will be presented for notice in July so they can be readopted by the December 2024 deadline. Finally, the definition of youth was discussed, as was the merit of variations or continuity between the age of youth for hunting different species. This affects the deer, turkey, migratory birds, game lands, and trout rules.

Land Acquisition & Property Committee Report – June 5, 2024 – *Tom Berry, Chair*, reported The Land Acquisition and Property Committee met on Wednesday, June 5, 2024. The meeting

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began with a review of a newly formatted Phase I Land Investigation Form. The Committee provided feedback on the new form, requesting that staff add property tax value and asking price. The Committee also recommended that staff continue using the existing overview and detailed maps and suggested providing parcel data on the detailed map to show the parcel size of surrounding properties. A motion was made to approve the newly formatted Phase I form, contingent upon incorporating the recommended changes from the Committee. The Committee then reviewed and approved three Phase I land acquisition proposals and one Phase II land acquisition proposal. Two other property matters were presented: the Committee approved the Dominion Easement Request in Caswell County and voted to deny the TED Renewables Easement Request in Bertie County.

Habitat, Nongame, & Endangered Species Committee Report – June 5, 2024 – Kelly Davis, Chair, reported that the Habitat Nongame Endangered Species Committee met on Wednesday, June 5, 2024. Dr. Sara Schweitzer, Wildlife Management Division Assistant Chief, provided presentations on the Sea Turtles Conservation Plan and the nomination packet for the expiring terms of Nongame Wildlife Advisory Committee membership. The Committee endorsed both. The Committee then received a presentation by Rachael Hoch, Aquatic Wildlife Diversity Assistant Chief, on a reintroduction proposal for Carolina Heelsplitter in Stevens Creek. The reintroduction would be done under the NC Programmatic Safe Harbor Agreement, and the proposal was unanimously approved. Next, Cindy Simpson, Wildlife Action Plan Coordinator, provided updates on the major revision of the Wildlife Action Plan, including the projected timeline, a new tool to identify opportunity areas, opportunities for participation, and where to find more information. The final revision is due to the USFWS no later than September 30, 2025. Shannon Deaton, Habitat Conservation Program Manager, then provided information on the 2024 Thomas L. Quay Wildlife Diversity Award, explaining the criteria and procedure used to select a recipient. Shannon also provided information on an America the Beautiful Challenge grant the agency was recently awarded to benefit Southeast Species of Greatest Conservation Need in NC, SC, FL, and GA. Two guests, Dr. Greg Cope, a distinguished professor at NC State University, and Chris Eads, faculty at NC State University, joined the Committee Meeting to provide information on the newly constructed Yates Mill Aquatic Conservation Center located in Wake County. Chris Eads, Assistant Director of the Center, presented information on the mission of the new Center, which uses cutting-edge techniques to rear imperiled aquatic species, supports staff and student research, and provides public outreach and education opportunities. A future field trip for Commissioners will be planned.

Motion from the Habitat, Nongame & Endangered Species Committee — On a motion by Kelly Davis, and a second by Jim Ruffin, the Commission approved a motion to recognize Dr. Wilson Laney as the 2024 Thomas L. Quay Wildlife Diversity Award recipient.

Big Game Committee Report – June 5, 2024 – *David Hoyle, Chair*, reported that the Big Game Committee met on Wednesday, June 5, 2024. The meeting began with a presentation by *Kathryn Jewell, Social Scientist*, who shared interesting findings and information from the Wildlife Feeding and Baiting in NC survey. The survey explored the percentage of deer and bear hunters who are baiting or feeding, the quantities they are putting out, and other interesting facts about baiting and feeding by deer and bear hunters. The committee looks forward to seeing the full summary of the survey in the near future. Next, *Colleen Olfenbuttel, Game and Furbearer Program Supervisor*, gave a brief update on the Coastal Bear Population research project, which is in its final field season. She also discussed the different data that will be used to inform the new bear plan and the

general timeline for its completion, with a target date of December 2026. Having no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Finance, Audit & Compliance Committee Report – June 5, 2024 – Brad Stanback, Vice Chair, reported that the Finance, Audit & Compliance Committee met on Wednesday, June 5, 2024. Jason Cottle, Chief Financial Officer, presented a comparison of current and prior fiscal year-todate expenditures and revenues in both the general fund and capital improvement fund categories, offering comments for any categories either increasing or decreasing in excess of one million dollars. An update was also provided on the current value and asset allocation of the agency's Endowment fund, including the amount of expendable income currently available for use, as well as the amount of expendable income presently obligated for agency priorities. Kyle Briggs, Chief Deputy Director, introduced WRC's new Internal Auditor, Elizabeth Davis. Elizabeth Davis provided an overview of internal audit and compliance requirements for the internal audit function. The 2024 updated WRC Internal Audit Charter was presented to the committee. Key updates to the new charter were discussed, and the Committee voted to approve the charter. Davis also presented the Self-Assessment Maturity Model and discussed where the audit function was assessed within the model, based on work completed in fiscal year 2024. She detailed that there were two engagements in process, which included the Enhancing Accountability in Government through Leadership and Education project and the annual internal audit risk assessment.

Committee of the Whole Report – June 5, 2024 – Monty Crump, Chair, reported that the Committee of the Whole met on Wednesday, June 5, 2024. The meeting began with Brian Daniels, Customer Service Manager, Customer Support Services, presenting Reciprocal License Fees. Next, Melva Bonner, Regulatory Analyst, presented temporary and permanent rulemaking for Needmore Game Lands and temporary rulemaking for Buffalo Cove, South Mountains, and Kings Creek Game Lands. Daron Barnes, Land and Water Access Division Chief, Brad Howard, Wildlife Management Division Chief, and Christian Waters, Inland Fisheries Division Chief, presented the annual cycle rule proposals for 2025-2026. The Committee endorsed modifying the turkey season as proposed by staff and changing the definition of youth back to under 16. Finally, Christian Waters presented temporary rulemaking for Striped Mullet and White Mullet, Harvest Reporting Requirements, and Flounder. After a very lively discussion about these rules, the Committee adjourned.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT – **Searching for Sound** – *Aubrey Greene, Wildlife Diversity Biologist,* gave a presentation titled "Searching for Sound". The presentation highlighted how the division uses Autonomous Recording Units (ARUs) that acoustically monitor threatened and endangered species, species of greatest conservation need, and game species to inform conservation, management, and regulation efforts.

RECIPROCAL HUNTING LICENSE FEES FOR NON-RESIDENTS – On a motion by Joe Budd and a second by Jim Ruffin, the Commission approved the resolution to allow changes in nonresident hunting license fees for neighboring states to establish parity, under the authority of NCGS 113-275(a1) presented in (EXHIBIT C) by *Brian Daniels, Customer Service Manager, Customer Support Services*

Parcel Boundaries






FINAL ADOPTION FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO 15A NCAC 10F .0321 – PENDER COUNTY, TOWN OF SURF CITY

The Notice of Text for adoption of amendments to 15A NCAC 10F .0321 Pender County-Town of Surf City, to create two no-wake zones along the Town waterfront in Topsail Sound and Topsail Creek, one north of the channel setback of the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW), from a point east of the N.C. Highway 210 Surf City Bridge eastward 550 yards to a point in Topsail Sound and a portion of Topsail Creek; and one no-wake zone south of the channel setback of the ICW in Topsail Sound from a point east of the N.C. Highway 210 Surf City Bridge eastward 480 yards to a point in the Sound adjacent to the mouth of Deep Creek was published in the *NC Register* with open comment period and public hearing, per the Administrative Procedure Act.

As part of the agency's periodic review of Rules, the Notice of Text included names, addresses and descriptions of the Boating Access Areas in Pender County that are owned or operated by the WRC and have been added for codification in the NCAC.

Staff seeks your adoption of these proposed Rule amendments, subject to final review by the N.C. Rules Review Commission. The earliest effective date of the Rule will be October 1, 2024.

15A NCAC 10F .0321 PENDER COUNTY

- (a) Regulated Areas. This Rule shall apply applies to the following waters in Pender County:
 - (1) the canal adjoining Olde Point Development in Hampstead;
 - (1) Hampstead:
 - (A) the canal adjoining Olde Point Subdivision adjacent to the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) near 2019 Kings Landing Road; and
 - (B) the waters within 50 yards of the Hampstead Boating Access Area adjacent to the ICW at 613 Lewis Road.
 - (2) NewTopsail_Beach, Town of Topsail Beach:

 (A)The the First Finger Canal northeast of Godwin Avenue adjacent to Banks Channel; and Drive in New Topsail Beach;
 - (3) (B) Town of Topsail Beach, the waters on the eastern side of Banks Channel within 100 yards of the shoreline beginning 155 yards west of Bush's Marina, extending northeast ending 75 yards from the shoreline perpendicular to Haywood Avenue; Avenue.

- (4)(3) <u>Castle Hayne.</u> the <u>The</u> waters of the Northeast Cape Fear River between the U.S. Highway 117 bridge and the railroad trestle 60 yards east of the Castle Hayne Boating Access Area. Area; and
- (5)(4) Town of Surf City, City:
 - (A) the waters of the channel in Topsail Sound known as Deep Creek, from <u>near</u> its mouth at a point at 34.43199 N, 77.54795 W 34.43208 N,77.54808 W to its end west of Goldsboro Avenue. Avenue;
 - (B) the waters of Topsail Sound and Topsail Creek northeast of the channel setback of the ICW, beginning north of the channel setback east of the N.C. Highway 210 Surf City Bridge at a point at 34.42975 N, 77.55213 W, then 550 yards northeastward to a line from the point north of the channel setback at 34.43294 N, 77.54837 W to a point on the island at 34.43327 N, 77.54873 W, then northward including waters of Topsail Sound and a portion known as Topsail Creek to a line from a point on the town shoreline at 34.43425 N, 77.55069 W, to a point on the island at 34.43378 N, 77.55017 W; and
 - (C) the waters of Topsail Sound southeast of the channel setback of the ICW, beginning south of the channel setback and east of the N.C. Highway 210 Surf City Bridge at a point at 34.42902 N, 77.55200 W including the waters where the Surf City Boating Access Area and Soundside Park are located at 517 Roland Avenue, then 480 yards northeastward to a point south of the channel setback at 34.43167 N,77.54848 W, adjacent to the mouth of Deep Creek.
- (5) Burgaw:
 - (A) the waters within 50 yards of the Shelter Creek Boating Access Area on Shelter Creek, at 12380 Shaw Highway.
 - (B) the waters within 50 yards of the Sawpit Landing Boating Access Area on the Northeast

 Cape Fear River, at 527 Whitestocking Road Extension; and
 - (C) the waters within 50 yards of the Holly Shelter Boating Access Area on the Northeast Cape Fear River, at 7271 Shaw Highway.
- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Placement of Markers. <u>The following agencies shall place markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers:</u>
 - (1) The the Board of Commissioners of Pender County for the regulated areas designated in Subparagraphs(a)(1),(2), and (4) of this Rule, Part (a)(1)(A) and (a)(2)(A) of this Rule; and
 - (2) the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Topsail Beach for the regulated area designated in Subparagraph Part (a)(2)(B) of this Rule. Rule, and the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Surf City for the regulated area designated in Subparagraph (a)(5) of this Rule shall be the designated agencies for placement of the markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

- (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The following agencies shall place and maintain markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers:
 - (1) the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Surf City for the markers for the regulated areas designated in Parts (a)(4)(A), (B), and (C) of this Rule; and
 - (2) the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission for the markers for the regulated areas designated in Parts (a)(1)(B), and (a)(5)(A), (B) and (C) of this Rule.



15A NCAC 10F .0305– BRUNSWICK COUNTY, TOWN OF SUNSET BEACH APPLICATION FOR RULEMAKING FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENT AT SOUTH JINKS CREEK

The Wildlife Resources Commission received an application and Resolution from the Town of Sunset Beach, requesting permanent rulemaking in an area of South Jinks Creek beginning in the navigation channel north of the Feeder Channel and including the waters of the Feeder Channel, four narrow finger canals at the end of the Feeder Channel, and the Bay Area.

The Town of Sunset Beach is requesting permanent rulemaking that replaces and slightly enlarges the former temporary no-wake zone that was established in South Jinks Creek during a two-year dredging project. The Town is concerned with increasing vessel traffic, shoaling, and vessels traveling too fast for conditions in this portion of South Jinks Creek, with more than 100 docks. During warm weather the town is crowded with visitors who do not know the waters well. Motorized vessels compete with kayaks, canoes, and personal watercraft that enter and exit the navigation channel to go to and return from the Intracoastal Waterway. The Town is hopeful that a permanent no-wake zone in South Jinks Creek will help maintain safer conditions in the congested and shallow creek with a very narrow navigation channel.

If the Rule is adopted, the Town of Sunset Beach will bear the cost for purchase and placement of regulatory markers. Brunswick County is a coastal county subject to the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permitting requirements. The WRC's blanket CAMA permit authorizes any coastal county to place or replace Aids to Navigation (ATONS) at no additional cost.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement's assessment showed sandbars and many docks in four narrow canals and the Bay Area. The water depth is tide dependent and shoaling is frequent there. Enforcement found no reported boating incidents in South Jinks Creek and stated that residents operate their vessels with regard for the safety of others and themselves.

Staff requests that the Commission consider the application from the Town of Sunset Beach for permanent water safety rulemaking in South Jinks Creek.

Staff also recommends approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period, to correct coordinates at the no-wake zone at the Odell Williamson Bridge at Ocean Isle Beach and remove the Dutchman Creek Boating Access Area from the NCAC, as it is a duplicate entry under a different name.

 - (3) Morningstar Marinas Southport, shore to shore beginning at its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91685 N, 78.02865 W;
 - (4) Shallotte River east of S.R. 1233, otherwise known as Village Point Road SW south of the Town of Shallotte, shore to shore from its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91477 N, 78.37103 W to point 500 feet north at 33.91613 N, 78.37126 W;
 - (5) Montgomery Slough, otherwise known as Davis Creek, within 100 yards of the hotel and marina at the northern end of 57th Place West in the Town of Oak Island;
 - (6) the waters in the natural and concrete canals located on the south side of the Intracoastal Waterway, east of N.C. Highway 904 in the Town of Ocean Isle Beach;
 - (7) Town Creek east of S.R. 1609, otherwise known as Clearview Lane in Town Creek Township, shore to shore from a point at 34.16788 N, 78.07139 W, north and east around a bend in the creek to a point at 34.16910 N, 78.07030 W;
 - (8) Montgomery Slough, otherwise known as Davis Creek, shore to shore from its entrance at the Intracoastal Waterway west of SW Yacht Drive at a point at 33.92145 N, 78.19408 W, to the canal end at NE 40th Street in the Town of Oak Island;
 - (9) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Sunset Beach in the vicinity of the S.R. 1172 Sunset Beach Bridge and Sunset Beach Boating Access Area at 101 Sunset Boulevard, shore to shore from a point 150 yards east of the Sunset Beach Bridge at 33.88173 N, 78.50995 W, to a point 50 yards west of the bridge at 33.88111 N, 78.51194 W;
 - (10) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Ocean Isle Beach in the vicinity of the N.C. Highway 904 Odell Williamson Bridge and Ocean Isle Beach Boating Access Area at 67 Causeway Drive, shore to shore from a point 100 yards east of the N.C. Highway 904 Odell Williamson Bridge at 33.89578 N, 78.43870 W, to a point 100 yards west of the Bridge at 33.89567 N, 78.51194 W; 33.89551 N, 78.44077 W;
 - (11) Lockwood Folly River at Rourk's Landing Subdivision, beginning at a point south of the subdivision at 33.95338 N, 78.22553 W, north and west around two sharp bends in the channel and ending north at a point at 33.95539 N, 78.22900 W;

- (12) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Holden Beach, N.C. Highway 130 Holden Beach Bridge and Holden Beach Boating Access Area at 99 S. Shore Drive, shore to shore between a point 250 feet west and a point 100 feet east of the Holden Beach Bridge;
- (13) Intracoastal Waterway, within 50 yards of the Oak Island Boating Access Area at 4950 Fish Factory Road SE in Southport;
- (14) within 50 yards of the Sunset Harbor Boating Access Area adjacent to the Intracoastal Waterway at 356 Riverview Drive SE in Bolivia;
- (15) within 20 yards of the shoreline and 50 yards east and 50 yards west of the Brick Landing Boating Access Area on the Intracoastal Waterway at 1921 Brick Landing Road SW in Shallotte;



15A NCAC 10F .0305– BRUNSWICK COUNTY, TOWN OF SUNSET BEACH APPLICATION FOR RULEMAKING FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENT AT FOX CREEK

The Wildlife Resources Commission received an application and Resolution from the Town of Sunset Beach, requesting permanent rulemaking in a portion of Fox Creek along North Shore Drive between 28th and 40th Street, shore to shore in an extremely shallow and narrow navigation channel.

The Town of Sunset Beach requests permanent rulemaking to create a no-wake zone in the most hazardous and shallow portion of this tidal creek that winds around the marsh until it reaches the Intracoastal Waterway. The Town Manager reports that in some places in the channel there are just 20 yards between the end of docks to the mud flat. At low tide parts of the creek are 6-12 inches deep, with oyster masses and remains of dock pilings that are exposed or close to the surface. Underwater obstructions make it dangerous for any motorized vessel to travel at greater than no-wake speed. Visitors to the area and operators of personal watercraft do not observe safety precautions in the area and there are reports of races in the marsh that endanger kayakers, anglers who are not underway, and residents leaving the creek to get to the ICW and who must work around boaters who do not know the conditions and endanger others with reckless operation at unregulated speed. The most hazardous conditions occur along North Shore Drive between 28th and 40th Street. The Town submitted some photographs of Fox Creek at high and low tide, showing the oyster rocks, exposed broken pilings and other obstructions barely underwater at high tide.

If the Rule is adopted, the Town of Sunset Beach will bear the cost for purchase and placement of regulatory markers. Brunswick County is a coastal county subject to the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permitting requirements. The WRC's blanket CAMA permit authorizes any coastal county to place or replace Aids to Navigation (ATONS) at no additional cost.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned an Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement's assessment stated that there are very low tide conditions, oyster beds, sandbars, private docks at the navigation channel, marsh grass and sharp bends in the creek that block the view of anglers and non-motorized vessels. There have been verified complaints from the Town of Sunset Beach, with requests for rulemaking and signage to slow vessel traffic through the barely navigable area at low tide.

Staff requests that the Commission consider the application from the Town of Sunset Beach for water safety rulemaking to create a no-wake zone in the small section of Fox Creek to mitigate multiple hazards to boater and water recreationist safety.








BACKGROUND

South Jinks Creek

A proposed amendment to Rule 15A NCAC 10F .0305(a)(18) Brunswick County – Town of Sunset Beach (APPENDIX 1), will create a no-wake zone in a portion of South Jinks Creek, from a point in the navigation channel of the creek immediately north of the feeder channel, southward along a line in the navigation channel to a point on the beach shoreline at 33.87325 N, 78.49033 W, and will include the waters west of the line including the entire feeder channel with four finger canals, and the bay area. This portion of South Jinks Creek was recently dredged to accommodate busy boat traffic that uses the narrow navigation channel of the creek to and from the Intracoastal Waterway to the north. The safety hazards from dredging equipment, shallow water and shoaling necessitated temporary rulemaking over two years to mitigate boater safety and navigation hazards during the dredging project.

The Town of Sunset Beach applied for rulemaking to permanently establish and expand the no wake zone to continue to mitigate hazards to boater safety. The Town Council is concerned about safe operation of motorized and non-motorized vessels during low tides in shallow water with

multiple shoals and narrow dredged channels. The feeder channel is just 30 yards wide with narrow passage between docks on both sides and four narrow finger canals with docks on both sides located at the end of the feeder channel. There are multiple houses and 55 docks in the bay area with a narrow navigable area between the docks, in some places 20-30 yards, where maneuverability is limited.

The Town of Sunset Beach will purchase the no-wake buoys and mark the no-wake zone South Jinks Creek at an estimated one-time cost of \$1174.

Fox Creek

A proposed amendment to Rule 15A NCAC 10F .0305(a)(19) Brunswick County – Town of Sunset Beach (APPENDIX 1), will create a no-wake zone approximately 810 yards long along a portion of Fox Creek adjacent to North Shore Drive West, between 28th Street and 40th Street. The portion of Fox Creek is quite narrow and shallow such that navigation for motorized vessels is limited, mostly to high tide. Residents who routinely travel by boat to the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) and back to their homes contend with tidal changes, obstructions, and diminished sight lines in the marsh and narrow channel.

The Town of Sunset Beach applied for rulemaking to mitigate hazards to boater safety. The Town Council is concerned about safe and reasonable operation of motorized and non-motorized vessels during low tides, with underwater obstructions that include sandbars and visible oyster beds. Motor boaters and dock owners are most concerned about hazardous conditions for tourists unfamiliar with the area, at high and low tide in the portion of the creek in front of the residential development. Non-motorized, low profile vessels such as kayaks and canoes experience limited sight lines from marsh grasses and bends in the creek. There have been near misses from encounters between motorboaters, kayakers, personal watercraft operators, and anglers who are not underway.

The Town of Sunset Beach will purchase the Aids to Navigation (ATONS) no-wake buoys and mark the no-wake zone on Fox Creek at an estimated one-time cost of \$1174.

IMPACT ANALYSIS

State Impact Analysis:

The WRC will be responsible for maintenance of the buoys once installed. It is anticipated that the total annual cost to maintain the buoys will not exceed \$200.00/year (assuming the chain and anchor are not needed) and only if a buoy goes missing or is destroyed and must be replaced.

Local Impact Analysis:

The Town of Sunset Beach will be responsible for the purchase and placement of the ten no-wake buoys needed to mark the no-wake zone in South Jinks Creek and Fox Creek. The purchase and installation are estimated to cost approximately \$2,348. This includes two technicians' time to place ten buoys (12 hours x $$29^1/hr = 348) and the cost of ten buoys, chains, and anchors (\$200/buoy, chain and anchor x 10=\$2,348).

Brunswick County is a coastal county subject to CAMA permitting requirements by the N.C. Department of Coastal Management. The N.C. Department of Environmental Quality and Coastal Resources Commission (blanket) Permit Number 101-20 issued to the Wildlife Resources

Commission authorizes any coastal county in the State to replace or install Aids to Navigation (ATONS) at no additional cost.

Private Impact:

The proposed rule is anticipated to have minimal private impact. The regulated community will not incur any direct financial cost because of this rule, but their behavior will be restricted in the waters of the regulated portions of South Jinks Creek and Fox Creek with no-wake speed. However, the benefit of that restriction will be the mitigation of safety hazards to all boaters and other water recreationists in the shallow, narrow waters with multiple underwater obstructions and diminished sight lines.

 - (3) Morningstar Marinas Southport, shore to shore beginning at its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91685 N, 78.02865 W;
 - (4) Shallotte River east of S.R. 1233, otherwise known as Village Point Road SW south of the Town of Shallotte, shore to shore from its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91477 N, 78.37103 W to point 500 feet north at 33.91613 N, 78.37126 W;

15A NCAC 10F .0330– CARTERET COUNTY APPLICATION FOR RULEMAKING FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENT AT RAYMOND'S GUT ON WHITE OAK RIVER

The Wildlife Resources Commission received an application and Resolution from Carteret County, requesting rulemaking for a no-wake zone shore to shore in the waters of Raymond's Gut off the White Oak River in Peletier.

Carteret County requested a no-wake zone to mitigate hazards to navigation in the narrow and shallow waters in the cove.

The County states that if the Rule is adopted, the County will bear the cost for purchase and placement of regulatory markers. Carteret County is a coastal county subject to the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permitting requirements. The WRC's blanket CAMA permit authorizes any coastal county to place or replace Aids to Navigation (ATONS) at no additional cost.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement found no statutorily required hazards to navigation in the cove that might warrant rulemaking to create a no-wake zone there. It was noted that the length of the proposed no-wake zone is approximately 1900 feet. It would take approximately seven minutes to travel the length of the no-wake zone at idle speed. The water depth is tide dependent, but there is ample room in this uncongested cove for boaters to navigate and distance themselves from docks. There have been no boating incidents or citations issued in the cove.

Staff requests that the Commission consider the application from Carteret County for a decision about water safety rulemaking at Raymond's Gut. Staff also recommends approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period, to incorporate into the NCAC ten boating access areas operated by the WRC in Carteret County (Exhibit F-2). Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will consider adoption of the amendments for Carteret County.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING A "NO WAKE ZONE" IN RAYMONDS GUT A TRIBUTARY OF THE WHITE OAK RIVER

WHEREAS, At least fourteen (14) "No Wake Zones" have been established in Carteret County by North Carolina Administrative Code and/or the North Carolina State Legislative; and







The Wildlife Resources Commission received a request from Duke Energy LLC to initiate the rulemaking process to create a restricted area in a cove at Wittenburg Access Area on Lake Hickory in Bethlehem. Vessel entry would be prohibited in the restricted area in the waters of the cove south of the Wittenburg Access Area where the swim beach that has been marked by Duke Energy is located. Enforcement completed a boater safety hazards assessment matrix (Attachment A) and advised that the proposed restricted area at Wittenburg Access Area is appropriate to ensure safety in the cove where the swimming area is located.

Staff requests Commission approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period, to adopt a restricted area maintained by Duke Energy LLC at Wittenburg Access Area. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will consider adoption of the amendment for Alexander County.

AGENCY REQUEST TO CORRECT LOCATION OF NO-WAKE ZONE NEAR RINK DAM, ENDING WITHIN 50 YARDS OF SAND BAR MARINA AND GRILL DOCKS, TAYLORSVILLE

Earlier this year Alexander County requested a boater safety hazards assessment in the cove on Lake Hickory shore to shore in Taylorsville, southeast of the existing Rule beginning at the Rink Dam, under the Rink Dam Road Bridge and ending within 50 yards of the Sand Bar Marina and Grill docks. Enforcement completed a matrix, which was negative for sufficient boater safety hazards shore to shore in the cove to extend the no-wake zone 400 yards to the mouth of the cove. Enforcement did notice during the investigation that the Sand Bar Marina and Grill, which has a fuel dock and a no-wake zone that ends within 50 yards of the fuel dock in the cove, has extended its marina docks since 2022. The current no-wake zone now as marked is only 12 yards from the new docks. Within the assessment matrix Enforcement recommended rulemaking to extend the no-wake zone at the Sand Bar Marina and Grill docks to within 50 yards of the new docks at the marina. (Attachment B - recommendation for extension of NWZ around Marina docks in matrix).

Based on the negative assessment of sufficient boater safety hazards to extend the no-wake zone to the mouth of the cove, Alexander County declined to submit an application for rulemaking in the entire cove. However, they concurred with WRC's offer to propose an amendment to extend the current no-wake zone approximately 50 yards southeast of the current marina docks. The existing buoy is sufficient to mark the extended no-wake zone and will be moved by the Wildlife Resources Commission at no expense to the County.

Staff requests Commission approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period, to extend the no-wake zone from the Rink Dam southeast, ending 50 yards from the new docks at the marina. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will consider adoption of the amendment for Alexander County.



The Lake Wylie Marine Commission (LWMC) submitted an application for rulemaking to establish a no-wake zone at Joyner's Marina on the northeast side of Buster Boyd Bridge, 16310 York Road, Charlotte, within 50 yards of the marina and in the waters of the cove to the southeast, ending at a point on the shore at 35.10084 N, 81.03610 W.

The LWMC requested a no-wake zone to mitigate hazards at the marina, which sees heavy vessel traffic at the marina, especially in the summer. Joyner's Marina is adjacent to an existing no-wake zone on the east side of the Buster Boyd Bridge. Vision is obstructed for vessels leaving marina docks into the main channel. Sizable wakes at the fuel docks increase the possibility of fuel spills. The LWMC states that Steele Creek Fire Department stores their vessels there and regularly conducts training exercises in the cove.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement recommends placing a no-wake zone at Joyner's Marina and the waters in the cove east of the marina to mitigate several safety hazards, including limited vision and a fuel pump on the marina dock. Wakes from boats near the fuel dock may cause fuel spills and possible fires. There are associated dangers from limited vision surrounding the three main docks that see heavy vessel traffic, especially during the summer. The only boat access areas in the cove are part of the private marina that is apart from the public fueling dock.

Staff requests Commission approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period and public comment period for the amendment in 15A NCAC 10F .0333(a)(15). Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will consider adoption of the amendment for a no-wake zone at Joyner's Marina.

The LWMC reports that Joyner's Marina fuel docks are outside the current no-wake zone established around the Buster Boyd bridge. This is a high traffic area due to the marina and public access area. The three marina docks create a blind spot while entering the busy channel under the bridge. Marine Max directly across from Joyner's Marina and River Point Marina and Terry's Marina slightly to the north add to the vessel traffic in the area. Accelerating boats create sizable wakes in the fuel dock area, creating potential fuel spill hazard while fueling vessels. Also located at the Marina are the Steele Creek Fire Department rescue boat where they also conduct training exercises, and a Tow Boat vessel to help stranded boaters. The shoal east of the marina is heavily used by boaters who anchor there for recreation. The Lake Wylie Marine Commission has requested the review of a No Wake Zone near Joyner's Marina located on Lake Wylie. Joyner's Marina is located at 16310 York Rd, Charlotte, NC. The proposed area at Joyner's Marina extends an already existing No Wake Zone attached to the Buster Boyd Bridge (Highway 49/York Road) to the end of the cove surrounding the marina. This No Wake Zone has been proposed by the Lake Wylie Marine Commission because of the increasing amount of boat traffic attached to the marina during the summer season. The Lake Wylie Marine Commission says this is an area where vision is obstructed for vessels leaving the marina docks back into the main channel. Passing vessels also create sizable wakes at the fuel dock, increasing the possibility of fuel spills. Additionally, the Steele Creek Fire Department stores their vessels here, and also regularly conducts training exercises in this cove. They also state that a large number of vessels congregate in the cove just south of the marina for recreational swimming.

On 01/20/2024 Officer Sampson Parker Jr. and I patrolled the area to complete a boating safety assessment. Visually, this is a very wide cove that narrows down directly northeast of the Buster Boyd Bridge where the marina is located. The narrowest area in the proposed no wake zone is 89' across. The widest point is approximately 529'. The proposed area is approximately 800' in length. A vessel travelling at no wake speed will take approximately two minutes, 26 seconds to travel through the proposed No Wake Zone. The proposed No Wake Zone is an extension of the existing wake zone south of the marina and north of the bridge. There are currently no public swimming areas or fishing areas within the cove. The only boat access areas are part of the private marina, apart from the public fueling dock.

The reason that I am recommending this to be a no wake zone is the fact that the dock has a fuel pump located on it. If boaters were allowed to create a wake in the area it could cause a major issue if someone was using the fuel pump. The safety hazards include fuel spills and possible fires. The associated dangers of limited vision surrounding the three main docks that are listed by the Lake Wylie Marine Commission were also found to be true. This area has no recorded boat incidents reported. The existing No Wake Zone underneath the bridge has produced No Wake Zone infractions. My conclusion is that the fact that there is a fuel dock, accompanied with a limited field of vision near the marina docks is enough to warrant a No Wake Zone. This conclusion comes after patrolling the area and completing a full review of the proposed No Wake Zone.



This is an additional view of the proposed No Wake Zone. Note the Buster Boyd Bridge in the right section of the picture.





The Lake Wylie Marine Commission (LWMC) submitted an application for rulemaking to extend the no-wake zone around Sadler Island on the west side of the island from its current end, southward to a line south of the island from a point on the Gaston County mainland at 35.26455 N, 81.01562 W to a point on the Mecklenburg County mainland at 35.26501 N, 81.01374 W.

The LWMC requested a no-wake zone to mitigate additional boating safety hazards in the narrow congested channel west and south of Sadler Island, with many additional docks that have been added on the Gaston County side of the lake since the Rule for Sadler Island was approved in 2015.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement noted that regulating vessel speed near the additional docks south of Tailrace Marina would extend the no-wake zone to .75 miles. which would take a boater traveling at no-wake speed approximately eleven minutes to travel from north to south. It would take approximately 14 minutes traveling south to north against the current. Enforcement believes this would cause unnecessary congestion in an area where boaters already reduce their speed as they travel through the northern end of the no-wake zone around the island. There are no swimming or fishing areas within this channel. The only boat access areas are part of a private marina apart from public docks at J.R. Cash's Restaurant. No recorded boat incidents have occurred.

Staff requests that the Commission consider action on this application from the Lake Wylie Marine Commission pertaining to extension of the no-wake zone west and south of Sadler Island, in 15A NCAC 10F .0333(a)(8).

The Lake Wylie Marine Commission has requested the review of a no wake zone on the channel west and south of Sadler Island. Sadler Island is located north of the Highway 85 bridge, in between the U.S. National Whitewater Center and Tailrace Marina (1010 Marina Village Drive, Mount Holly, NC). The island splits the Catawba River into and eastern and western channel. The proposed area at Sadler Island extends an already existing no wake zone attached to the docks of the Tailrace Marina (western channel), and the entirety of the eastern channel that runs parallel to the Whitewater Center. This no wake zone has been proposed by the Lake Wylie Marine Commission because of the increased development of docks on the Gaston County shoreline. The Lake Wylie Marine Commission says the new docks, coupled with the narrow nature of the channel has made this a congested area that poses safety concerns for traveling vessels. The existing no wake zone was commissioned in 2015, before the addition of the docks south of Tailrace Marina.

On 07/07/2024 Officers Kristofer Blankenship and Anthony Bynum patrolled the area to complete a boating safety assessment. Visually, Sadler Island splits the Catawba River into two narrow channels, east and west of the island. The narrowest area in the proposed no wake zone is approximately 269' across. The widest point is approximately 590'. The proposed area is approximately 2376' in length. A vessel travelling at no wake speed will take approximately 6 minutes, 45 seconds to travel through the proposed no wake zone. The proposed no wake zone is a southern extension of the existing no wake zone attached to the Tailrace Marina. The existing no wake zone also includes the entirety of the eastern channel adjacent to Sadler Island, connected to the dock of the U.S. National Whitewater Center. There are currently no public swimming areas or fishing areas within this channel. The only boat access areas are part of the private marina, apart from the public dock(s) for J.R. Cash's Restaurant.

The reason that I am not recommending this to be a no wake zone is because of the existing no wake zone located north and northeast of the proposed area. It is my opinion that boaters are already reducing their speed in anticipation of this existing area. Given the narrow nature of the channel(s), boaters are reducing their speed as well. If commissioned, this proposed area would extend the no wake zone to 0.75 miles, which would take a vessel traveling at no-wake speed (4 mph) approximately 11 minutes, 10 seconds traveling north-to-south. It would take even longer (approximately 14 minutes, 15 seconds) traveling south-to-north, against the current. This would cause unnecessary congestion of the area. This area has no recorded boat incidents reported. The existing no wake zone around Sadler Island has produced no wake zone infractions. My conclusion is that the newly constructed docks are not enough to warrant an addition to the existing no wake zone. Vessels are already reducing speed in anticipation of the area, and extending the no wake zone will only congest the channel even further due to mandated speed reductions.



15A NCAC 10F .0333– LAKE WYLIE IN MECKLENBURG AND GASTON COUNTIES APPLICATION FOR RULEMAKING FOR PROPOSED NO WAKE ZONE – SUNSET ISLAND

The Lake Wylie Marine Commission (LWMC) submitted an application for rulemaking to create a no-wake zone in the waters north and east of Sunset Island, located south of Rosapenny Road in Charlotte at the North Carolina/South Carolina border.

The LWMC requested a no-wake zone to mitigate boating safety hazards in the narrow, congested channel on the north and east side of Sunset Island. Neil Brennan, Executive Director, states there is a recognized recreational swim area to the north off Rosapenny Road. The recreational swim area is not open to the public. Mr. Brennan has spoken with Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department, which concurs with the proposed location of no-wake buoys to mark the cove northwest and east of Sunset Island along the NC/SC border.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement officers visited the area twice to provide a thorough assessment of the area. The area around Sunset Island is popular for as many as 20-30 boaters at a time to beach their vessels or anchor them along the shoreline. The area around Sunset Island is not located on the main channel. There is a moderate amount of traffic around the backside of the island. Estimated travel time at no-wake speed around the proposed no-wake zone is five minutes forty-five seconds. Officers have documented one vessel incident that occurred at Sunset Island. The most common violation seen in the area is personal watercraft operating at greater than no-wake speed within 100 feet of anchored vessels and swimmers. Enforcement of this Statute helps maintain safety in the area for those who beach their vessels at the island and for boaters who operate through that area. Enforcement officers do not believe there are sufficient safety hazards around Sunset Island to warrant creating a no-wake zone there.

Staff requests that the Commission consider action on this application from the Lake Wylie Marine Commission pertaining to creating a no-wake zone north and east of Sunset Island, in 15A NCAC 10F .0333(a)(14).

The Lake Wylie Marine Commission has requested that the area around Sunset Island be reviewed for consideration for a No-Wake Zone area. Sunset Island is located at the southernmost portion of Lake Wylie in North Carolina.

The area of Sunset Island is a popular area where boaters come to beach their vessels. It isn't uncommon to see 20 to 30 vessels beached or anchored along the shoreline of the island. The area that is being requested to be considered for a No Wake Zone is not located on the main channel of the lake. This area does see a moderate amount of traffic driving around the backside of the island where the NWZ request is being made. Traffic is higher on weekends and holidays as stated in the matrix. As indicated in the matrix the narrowest point is 285 feet or 95 yards wide. The widest point of the requested area is 1,080 feet or 360 yards wide. The total travel distance is approximately 1,440 feet in length. The estimated travel time for the requested NWZ is 5 minutes and 45 seconds. The area requested doesn't have any demonstrated public safety or navigational hazards to meet the requirements for establishing a NWZ. NC Wildlife Officers have one documented vessel incident that occurred in this area. Officers have also observed the most common violation which is personal watercraft operating at greater than No Wake Speed within 100' of anchored vessels and or swimmers. Enforcement of this law can help to maintain safety in the area for those who choose to beach their vessels along Sunset Island and for vessel operators that operate through the requested area.

Officers have observed the area as part of this matrix request on two separate occasions. Officer Shepperd and Sgt. Laton reviewed the area on Saturday, June 22, 2024. Officer Bynum and Sgt. Laton observed the area again on Sunday, June 30, 2024. Officers observed several vessels come through the area while vessels beached on the island. Officers have concluded that the area doesn't meet the requirements to become a marked No-Wake Zone as a result of these observations.



15A NCAC 10F .0333- LAKE WYLIE IN MECKLENBURG AND GASTON COUNTIES TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS

As part of the rulemaking process for 15A NCAC 10F .0333 Lake Wylie, Staff recommends Commission approval to submit the Notice of Text for permanent rulemaking, to replace in the Rule the coordinates that describe the eastern side of the Buster Boyd bridge and the western side of the Buster Boyd Bridge, replacing coordinates that are in the NCAC that are in the waters of Lake Wylie in South Carolina, with coordinates in North Carolina.

Staff also recommends Commission approval to publish Notice of Text to strike from the North Carolina Administrative Code two entries that are struck through and highlighted below:

- 15A NCAC 10F .0333(a)(13) Other Facilities; and
- 15A NCAC 10F .0333(a)(14) Marked Swimming and Mooring Areas.

Those paragraphs are not necessary, and incorrectly appear to assign responsibility for placement and maintenance of markers for any facility or any marked swimming area or mooring area to the Lake Wylie Marine Commission. The Lake Wylie Marine Commission has requested that they be removed from the North Carolina Administrative Code (NCAC). Every facility or swim area on Lake Wylie is considered for rulemaking and codification in the NCAC on a case-by-case basis.

15A NCAC 10F .0333 MECKLENBURG AND GASTON COUNTIES

 - (4) N.C. Highway 27 Bridge. The waters shore to shore, from a point 50 yards north of the N.C. Highway 27 bridge in Mecklenburg and Gaston counties at 35.29849 N, 81.00346 W to a point 190 yards south of the N.C. Highway 27 bridge at 35.29635 N, 81.00424 W;
 - (5) Brown's Cove. The area beginning at the mouth of Brown's Cove in Mecklenburg County shore to shore, at a point at 35.16453 N, 81.00474 W, west to a point at 35.16480 N, 81.00309 W;
 - (6) Paradise Point Cove. The waters of Paradise Point Cove in Gaston County between Paradise Circle and Lake Front Drive, west of a line from a point on the south shore at 35.18853 N, 81.04036 W to a point on the north shore at 35.18991 N, 81.04136 W;
 - (7) Withers Cove. The waters of Withers Cove in Mecklenburg County, shore to shore, beginning at a line north of the Mecklenburg Charlotte Fire Department and Police Department Boathouse from a point on the west shore at 35.14632 N, 81.00383 W to a point on the east shore at 35.14713 N, 81.00173 W, and ending at a point 50 feet southeast of the Withers Bridge on S.R. 1116, otherwise known as Shopton Road, at 35.14576 N, 81.00187 W;
 - (8) Sadler Island. The waters shore to shore beginning at a line from a point on the west shore of Lake Wylie in Gaston County at 35.27481 N, 81.0138 W east to a point on the east shore of the Lake in Mecklenburg County at 35.27423 N, 81.01111 W, extending south on the Lake west of Sadler Island to a line from a point on the west shore of the Lake in Gaston County at 35.27079 N, 81.01525 W, east to a point on the west side of Sadler Island in Mecklenburg County at 35.27051 N, 81.01396 W, and the waters shore to shore east of Sadler Island in Mecklenburg County from a point at 35.27441 N, 81.01185 W, south southwest to a line from a point on the south shore of Sadler Island at 35.26635 N, 81.01432 W, south to a point on the Lake shore at 35.26494 N, 81.01368 W;
 - (8) Sadler Island. The waters shore to shore beginning at a line from a point on the west shore of Lake
 Wylie in Gaston County at 35.27481 N, 81.01380 W east to a point on the east shore of the Lake in

- (9) Other Bridges. The waters within 50 feet of a bridge in North Carolina that crosses the waters of Lake Wylie that is not otherwise specifically mentioned in this Paragraph;
- (10) Yachtsman on Lake Wylie Community. The waters within 50 yards of the community piers near the terminus of Waterside Drive in Mecklenburg County, and northward to include the waters east of the island that is west of Point Lookout Road, ending at a line from a point on the northern end of the island at 35.12226 N, 81.03306 W, east to a point on the shore at 35.12253 N, 81.03190 W;
- (11) Brown's Cove. The waters of Brown's Cove in Mecklenburg County, beginning at a line from a point on the east shore at 35.16892 N, 80.99702 W to a point on the west shore at 35.16948 N, 80.99783 W, northeast to a line from a point on the south shore at 35.16913 N, 80.99556 W to a point on the north shore at 35.17043 N, 80.99684 W;
- (12) South Point Boating Access Area. The waters within 50 yards of the South Point Boating Access Area in Gaston County, 199 Boat Launch Road in Belmont;
- (13) Other Facilities. The waters within 50 yards of a public boat launching ramp not otherwise specified in this Paragraph, public dock, public pier, public marina, public boat storage structure, or public boat service area; and
- (14) Marked Swimming and Mooring Areas. The waters within 50 yards of a marked swimming area or marked mooring area.
- (13) the waters within 50 yards of the docks at Joyner's Marina, 16310 York Road in Charlotte, and including the cove southeast of the docks to a point on the shore at 35.10084 N, 81.03610 W; and
- the waters north and east of Sunset Island near the North Carolina-South Carolina state line, east of a line from a point on the island at 35.04753 N, 81.04120 W to a point on the mainland at 35.04904 N, 81.04223 W, then south ending at a line from a point on the island at 35.04556 N, 81.03984 W to a point on the mainland at 35.04679 N, 81.03771 W.
- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Restricted Area. No person operating or responsible for the operation of a vessel shall allow it to enter the waters of the restricted area with swim beach at the South Point Access Area in Gaston County, at 199 Boat Launch Road in Belmont, north of the rope in the cove east of the South Point Boating Access Area.
- (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The following agencies are the designated agencies for placement and maintenance of markers implementing this Rule:
 - (1) the Lake Wylie Marine Commission for the regulated areas designated in Subparagraphs (a)(1) through (11), (13) and (14); (11), and (13) and (14);

- (2) the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission for the regulated area designated in Subparagraph (a)(12); and

Proposed Commercial Activity Permitting Rules 15A NCAC 10H .1800 Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

The Commission has the authority under G.S. 113-264 to license, regulate, prohibit, or restrict the public as to the use and enjoyment of Commission property and may charge a reasonable fee for access to or use of the property. Because of the increased demand for access and impact of large user groups, there is a need to regulate and track use by organized entities.

15A NCAC 10H .1801 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND FEES

This proposed rule establishes Commercial Use Permits, Event Permits and requirements for Use of Commission Property. Specifically, this rule:

- Defines commercial activities, use, and events
- Sets requirements for information needed to obtain a commercial permit



Proposed Temporary Amendments to Land and Water Access Rule for 2024-2025 Deer Season Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

The antlerless deer harvest during the introductory gun season is limited by 15A NCAC 10D .0251(b) on Nantahala Game Land solely to that portion which is located in Transylvania County. The majority of Nantahala Game Land is outside of Transylvania County and will not have an antlered or antlerless gun season. This proposal will standardize the antlered or antlerless blackpowder and gun seasons between Needmore and Nantahala Game Land. This is particularly important as both game lands have a shared boundary. If the Nantahala Game Land had a more conservative antlered or antlerless season than Needmore, the additional hunting pressure could result in negative impacts to resources and game land use during that period.

This proposal will remove the one day of introductory antlerless deer harvest during the gun season on the Needmore Game Land in Macon and Swain County and will align Needmore Game Land with the same antlerless deer season structure as Nantahala Game Land in Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Jackson, Macon, and Swain counties.



Proposed Temporary Amendments to 15A NCAC 10C .0307 Flounder Rule Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

The N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries (NCDMF) has stated they will not open the recreational flounder harvest season in 2024 due to the recreational sector exceeding the 2023 harvest allotment last year. To be consistent with the annual quota management measure of the North Carolina Southern Flounder Fishery Management Plan Amendment 3 and with the NCDMF closure of the recreational season in coastal waters, the proposed amendments will close the flounder harvest season in 2024.

Proposed Emergency/Temporary/Permanent Amendments to 10F .0304 – Bladen County Recommended by Agency Staff for Public Notice, Comment, and Presentation at Public Hearing

The Wildlife Resources Commission was recently notified of a serious safety hazard caused by amendments to the Rule for the restricted area at White Lake. The restricted area is 500 feet from the shoreline around the entire perimeter of the lake. Because of the size of the restricted area and the shallow water in that portion of the lake, swimming within the restricted area is common.

The most recent rule change allows for unrestricted directional operation of motorboats within the restricted area, a change from the previous rule which only allowed for operation perpendicular to the shoreline. Parallel operation of a motorboat in the restricted area, even at no wake speed, is dangerous to swimmers and needs to be regulated for safety of the public. The proposed amendment will require motorboats to travel perpendicular to the shore and at no wake speed within the restricted area at White Lake.
