<u>COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN</u> – Chairman Crump expressed gratitude to the staff for their hard work and contributions in supporting the board's work throughout the year. On behalf of the board, he acknowledged the devastation caused by Hurricane Helene and commended staff members involved in the agency's rescue and relief efforts. The board extended their full support to those affected by the hurricane and the ongoing recovery efforts. The Chairman also provided a status update on the search for the new Executive Director, noting that the process is ongoing and progress is being made.

<u>COMMENTS FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR</u> – Director Ingram provided an update on the agency's involvement in the rescue and relief efforts following Hurricane Helene. He expressed relief and gratitude to hear that employees and Commissioners living in the affected areas are safe and shared that they remain in his thoughts. He emphasized the agency's continued commitment to supporting the recovery, noting that while significant resources have already been allocated, the agency will remain engaged in relief efforts for the long term. In closing, the Executive Director mentioned the recent "Back in the Woods Hunt" in Chatham County, an event that gives disabled sportsmen the opportunity to return to the woods for deer hunting. He expressed appreciation for the staff members who attended and assisted in making the event a success.

There being no further business, the WRC webinar meeting was adjourned at 9:51 a.m. All exhibits are incorporated into the official record of this meeting by reference and are filed with the minutes.



§ 143-250.1. Wildlife Endowment Fund

- (d) (3). No expenditure or disbursement shall be made from the principal of the Wildlife Endowment Fund except as otherwise provided by law.
- (d) (4). The income received and accruing from the investments of the Wildlife Endowment Fund must be spent only in furthering the conservation of wildlife resources and the efficient operation of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission in accomplishing the purposes of the agency as set forth in G.S. 143-239.
- (g) The Wildlife Endowment Fund and the investment income therefrom shall not take the place of State appropriations or Agency receipts placed in the Wildlife Resources Fund, or any part thereof, but any portion of the income of the Wildlife Endowment Fund available for the purpose set out in subdivision (4) of subsection (d) shall be used to supplement other income of and appropriations to the Wildlife Resources Commission to the end that the Commission may improve and increase its services and become more useful to a greater number of people.

Additional Comments:

This property joins the Marshall tract that WRC is currently working with The Nature Conservancy to acquire. Acquiring the Pork Palace tract will add 0.57 miles of road frontage ownership along NC-53 and 0.55 miles of ownership along Bivens Bridge Road. It will also reduce the distance that WRC would have to build a road to gain access to the large portion of the Marshall tract. It shares 1.12 miles of boundary with the Marshall tract.

Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief):

The Pork Palace tract is a 238-acre property in Bladen County that is adjacent to the 3,297-acre Marshall tract that WRC has partnered with The Nature Conservancy to acquire, which is directly across NC Highway 53 from the Whitehall Tract of Whitehall Plantation Game Land. 60 percent (142 acres) of the property lies in the Conkill Bay Complex Significant Natural Heritage Area, which has an overall ranking of Very High. This Natural Area is an integral part of a larger and connected complex of natural areas and managed timberlands that provide extensive travel and dispersal corridor functions benefiting a large suite of animal groups. Furthermore, much of the Pork Palace tract has a Relative Conservation Value of 10 out of 10 for biodiversity and wildlife habitat which has been assessed by the NC Natural Heritage Program.

Approximately 76 acres of the property is made up of an intact Carolina Bay and there is 57 acres of agriculture land that would provide opportunities for longleaf pine community restoration, early successional habitat management, or dove field. Roughly 16 acres of mixed upland pine habitat with some longleaf pines exist on portions of the tract.

WRC biologists have identified 30 Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) that are likely to occur on the Pork Palace Tract as it currently exists. This property fits well into the regional and local land protection efforts that WRC and its partners have made in recent decades. Tract Name





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief):

The Big Swamp tract is a +/- 2,475-acre property in Robeson County that is largely made up of blackwater floodplain forests of cypress-tupelo swamp and bottomland hardwoods. A patchwork of nonforested wetlands exist on the property, which provides excellent wintering waterfowl habitat and waterfowl hunting opportunities. Approximately 20% (540 acres) of the property is made up of managed pine timberland that will offer good opportunities for wildlife habitat improvement activities through timber harvests, prescribed burning, and wildlife openings. This tract has excellent access with more than 10.5 miles of roads and trails.

The Big Swamp tract is located just 2.3 miles east of north from Warwick Bay State Natural Area, which is critical for bird conservation. It has a very large wading bird colony including one of the largest Wood Stork colonies in North Carolina. This tract is also located 1.75 miles west of south from Hester Millpond, home to another growing Wood Stork colony. Wood Storks are a federally threatened species. Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief):

The Jordan and Marissa Heitman tract is 2.14 acres of undeveloped property containing approximately 100 feet of Kesler Rd. The property has approximately 130 feet of existing gameland boundary on the western boundary. The property has approximately 127 feet of shared gameland boundary on the eastern boundary line. The property also has a power line running west-east to supply power for any potential development. The property is comprised of mixed pine and hardwood species common to Davidson county including Virginia and loblolly pine, red oak, white oak, and yellow poplar. This property is of value to WRC and the citizens of North Carolina because of it's location rather than its wildlife habitat or natural features. Currently legal access via terrestrial means, to the surrounding 130 plus acres of state-owned Yadkin River gameland (formerly Aloca), is in limbo. Neighbor(s) claim the WRC has no right-of-way or easement to utilize Kesler Rd. WRC has not been able to locate the original Tallahassee power and light deed circa 1928 to corroborate or disprove any claims. Traditionally Kesler Rd has been the access to the property. A singular land owner, owning two separate parcels totaling 6.6 acres is currently impeding access to the 130+ acre tract for the public and WRC staff. The Jordan and Marissa Heitman tract is located between two tracts owned by the landowner impeding access, as well as touches existing gameland on two sides. This parcel is in the ideal location to create user and administrative access from Kesler Road. Further the tract deed has clear language expressly granting an access easement from Boone's Cave Rd to Kesler Road to access the Jordan and Marrisa Heitman 2.14 acres, which also touches current gameland. This parcel was introduced to LAWA staff via enforecement as a potential solution to the increasing access issue surronding this gameland tract. LAWA staff contacted the landowners who are interested in selling to WRC to assist with the access issue. Enforcement and LAWA staff have fielded various conflicts and issues concerning access via Kesler Road and Enforcement indicated that a deed with clear access language is the best course of action to allow legal means for officers to manage any conflicts with neighboring property owners. Recreational opportunity within this 2.14 acre property will be limited due to proximty to road and residential dwellings, however, the acquisition of this parcel will allow for a myriad of gameland recreational use on the surrounding approximately 130 acres of adjoining gameland. This gameland tract has upland hunting oppotunuity as well as samll game, deer, turkey, and waterfowl. This parcel is the northenmost portion of the Yadkin River Game Land (formerly Alcoa).







Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief):

The Randy Mabry tract is 49.5 acres comprised of 96 percent mature loblolly pine plantation. These pines are approximately 45-50 years old with average basal area exceeding 120. Pine timber has received a single thnning and averages 13+ inches in DBH (diameter at breast height). The the midstory is comprised of yellow-poplar, chestnut oak, red maple, and black cherry. The remaining area is composed of mixed upland hardwood species consistent with the area. These areas are primarily chestnut oak dominant with yellow-poplar scattered throughout. The tract is bissected by a small unnamed tributary to the Yadkin River where loblolly pine, American beech, Black gum, yellow-poplar, American holly, chestnut oak, and scattered hickory species occur. The property would recieve timber extraction of loblolly plantataion, revenues from which, would exceed any stewardship costs to ownership, management, and protection of this property. The tributary area would be buffered from timber extraction and manageed as a natural area. A portion (about 18 acres) of the Randy Mabry tract is on the eastern slope of Bald Mountain with a representation rating collective rating of R5/C5 (General). This portion of the property is categorized as Dry-mesic Oak/Hickory Forest. Within this 18 acres also occurs elemental portions Piedmont Monadnock Forest with a ranking of S3 and G3/G4 upland community. These habitat types are of high importance to the region and are in serious decline. Management of the entire Randy Mabry tract would allow conversion from pine plantation back to these natural communities via timber extraction and natural successional processes. Within the natural communities associated with the Randy Mabry tract, species of note include; Crotalus horridus (timber rattlesnake ranked SC), Amorpha schwerinii (Piedmont indigo-bush WL), and Helianthus schweinitzii (Shweinitz's Sunflower E). Haliaeetus leucocephalus (Bald Eagle) regularly occurs within and adjacent to the property. Ambystoma talpoideum (mole salamander) ranked SNR/GNR occurs within the expectant area of the property. Smooth sunflower (SC) and Heller's Rabbit tobacco (SR), may also occur within the property with proper management. Recreational opportunity within this property mirrors that of the surrounding game land, however this property provides game land connectivity east-west and protects the eastern slope of Bald Mountain viewshed. Hunting opportunity for White-tailed deer (Odocoileus virginiana), and Eastern Wild Turkey (Meleagris gallapavo), are extremely abundant with access to this tract directly through the Bald Mountain complex. Small game hunting opportunity will be high on this tract as well. Offtrail hiking and wildlife viewing opportunities will be abundant and will further enchance the existing values of the Bald Mountain trail system. Unique rock outcrops across the property provide habitat for wildlife while also providing picturesque views of the landscape. No structures exist on the property, and the property has been historically used as hunting and timber land. Several old logging trails serpentine through the property, two of which connect with game land logging roads. Trails could be enhanced for administrative access. Boundary would only need new posting on the southern line of the property, less tha 1/4 mile.

This tract affords protection to the Bald Mountain viewshed and associated habitat types. At 49.5 acres the tract is a vital inholding bounded on three sides by NCWRC owned property. The quality is above the normal ranking for habitat within the area, while the quality, diversity, and rare/improtant features are comparabel to the other Tuckertown sections of the Yadkin River Game Land complex.

Comments

This parcel fills a critical inholding within existing public access and protects a high use area from future disturbance and development. Parcel buffers the Bald Mountain trail/viewshed.

Hunting and wildlife viewing opportunites are excellent for many species within this property Deer, turkey, squirrel and woodcock opportunity is currently high, with future mangement, bobwhite uail could be expected to move in from the surrounding game land. The parcel currently has merchantable loblolly pine plantation that is mature 45-50 years. Timber extraction would be a viable management strategy for this parcel with chip-n-saw sized wood, being the primary forest product.

This property is a significant inholding that is well suited to fill a 50 acre gap in game land connectivity and further simplify the boundary lines. 



Acquisition of Ripshin Ridge would solidify WRC ownership in that portion of Buffalo Cove Game Land and provide additional resource protection. Access to the tract is provided via Whisnant Rd (SR 1517). Though high-graded around the mid-1990's, forests onsite contain numerous large, very mature trees throughout, especially in Rich Cove, Alluvial, and Oak-Hickory Forests. 
Existing Infrastructure:






The Notice of Text for adoption of amendments for technical corrections to 15A NCAC 10F .0305 Brunswick County, to correct coordinates at the Odell Williamson Bridge in the Town of Ocean Isle Beach and to remove from the NC Administrative Code the Dutchman Creek Boating Access Area in Southport, as it is listed in the Rule as Oak Island BAA, was published in the September 3, 2024 *NC Register* with open comment period and public hearing, per the Administrative Procedure Act.

Staff seeks your adoption of the proposed Rule amendment, subject to final review by the N.C. Rules Review Commission. The earliest effective date of the Rule will be February 1, 2025.

15A NCAC 10F .0305 BRUNSWICK COUNTY

(a) Regulated Areas. This Rule shall apply <u>applies</u> to the waters described as follows:

- (1) Lockwood Folly River in the Town of Varnamtown, from a point at 33.94966 N, 78.22587 W, 500 yards northwest of the boat ramp located at the end of S.R. 1123 otherwise known as Fisherman Road, to a point at 33.94498 N, 78.22206 W, 180 yards southeast of the boat ramp, and including the portion of the river otherwise known as Mill Creek where it meets Lockwood Folly River directly across from the boat ramp, to a point 100 feet northeast at 33.94687 N, 78.22235 W;
- (2) Calabash River in the Town of Calabash, from a point in the water at the end of Marina Drive at 33.88638 N, 78.56254 W to a point 650 yards southwest at the southern end of the deep-sea fishing docks at 33.88344 N, 78.56751 W;
- (3) Morningstar Marinas Southport, shore to shore beginning at its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91685 N, 78.02865 W;
- (4) Shallotte River east of S.R. 1233, otherwise known as Village Point Road SW south of the Town of Shallotte, shore to shore from its intersection with the Intracoastal Waterway at a point at 33.91477 N, 78.37103 W to point 500 feet north at 33.91613 N, 78.37126 W;
- (5) Montgomery Slough, otherwise known as Davis Creek, within 100 yards of the hotel and marina at the northern end of 57th Place West in the Town of Oak Island;

- (7) Town Creek east of S.R. 1609, otherwise known as Clearview Lane in Town Creek Township, shore to shore from a point at 34.16788 N, 78.07139 W, north and east around a bend in the creek to a point at 34.16910 N, 78.07030 W;
- (8) Montgomery Slough, otherwise known as Davis Creek, shore to shore from its entrance at the Intracoastal Waterway west of SW Yacht Drive at a point at 33.92145 N, 78.19408 W, to the canal end at NE 40th Street in the Town of Oak Island;
- (9) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Sunset Beach in the vicinity of the S.R. 1172 Sunset Beach Bridge and Sunset Beach Boating Access Area at 101 Sunset Boulevard, shore to shore from a point 150 yards east of the Sunset Beach Bridge at 33.88173 N, 78.50995 W, to a point 50 yards west of the bridge at 33.88111 N, 78.51194 W;
- (10) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Ocean Isle Beach in the vicinity of the N.C. Highway 904 Odell Williamson Bridge and Ocean Isle Beach Boating Access Area at 67 Causeway Drive, shore to shore from a point 100 yards east of the N.C. Highway 904 Odell Williamson Bridge at 33.89578 N, 78.43870 W, to a point 100 yards west of the Bridge at 33.89567 N, 78.51194 W; <u>33.89551 N,</u> <u>78.44077 W;</u>
- (11) Lockwood Folly River at Rourk's Landing Subdivision, beginning at a point south of the subdivision at 33.95338 N, 78.22553 W, north and west around two sharp bends in the channel and ending north at a point at 33.95539 N, 78.22900 W;
- (12) Intracoastal Waterway in the Town of Holden Beach, N.C. Highway 130 Holden Beach Bridge and Holden Beach Boating Access Area at 99 S. Shore Drive, shore to shore between a point 250 feet west and a point 100 feet east of the Holden Beach Bridge;
- (13) Intracoastal Waterway, within 50 yards of the Oak Island Boating Access Area at 4950 Fish Factory Road SE in Southport;
- (14) within 50 yards of the Sunset Harbor Boating Access Area adjacent to the Intracoastal Waterway at 356 Riverview Drive SE in Bolivia;
- (15) within 20 yards of the shoreline and 50 yards east and 50 yards west of the Brick Landing Boating Access Area on the Intracoastal Waterway at 1921 Brick Landing Road SW in Shallotte;
- (16) within 50 yards of Rices Creek Boating Access Area on Rice Creek at 797 Gordon Lewis Drive SE in Winnabow;
- (17) within 50 yards of the Pireway Boating Access Area on Waccamaw River at 9739 Pireway Road NW in Ash; and Ash.
- (18) within 50 yards of the Dutchman Creek Boat Ramp on Dutchman Creek in Southport.

(b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.

(c) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The following agencies shall place or place and maintain markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers:

- (1) the Board of Aldermen of Varnamtown for placement in the area indicated in Subparagraph (a)(1) of this Rule;
- (2) the Board of Commissioners of Brunswick County for placement in areas indicated in Subparagraphs (a)(2) through (8) and (a)(11) of this Rule; and





15A NCAC 10F .0347 CRAVEN COUNTY APPLICATION FOR RULEMAKING FOR NO-WAKE ZONE AT BRICE CREEK

The Wildlife Resources Commission received an application and Resolution from Craven County, for rulemaking to establish a no-wake zone in Brice Creek, from north of Brice's Creek Bridge south-southwestward around Merchant's Grocery, docking facilities and fuel dock, and a public boat ramp, and ending at a line southeast of the peninsula and sharp curves on the east side of Brice Creek.

The County states that if the Rule is adopted, private citizens will bear the cost for purchase and placement of regulatory markers at no expense to the County. No Fiscal Note is required. Craven County is a coastal county subject to the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permitting requirements. The WRC's blanket CAMA permit authorizes the local government to place or replace Aids to Navigation (ATONS) at no additional cost.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and returned the Assessment Matrix (Attachment A). Enforcement found known hazards that justify creation of a no-wake zone. At the Brices Creek bridge, the channel between the bridge piers is about 50 feet wide. A power line just south of the bridge hangs two feet above the bottom of the bridge. There is a fuel dock and public boat ramp and dock near Merchant's Grocery. There are two 90-degree bends in the creek with diminished sight lines around the peninsula that just from the eastern shore of the creek. There has been one non-motorized boating incident at the bridge.

Staff requests Commission approval to publish Notice of Text in the *NC Register* with an open comment period and public hearing, for rulemaking for a no-wake zone in Brice Creek. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will consider adoption of the amendment for Craven County.





• Justification:

In deciding whether a body of water should include a posted no wake zone, which would restrict the speed of vessels, it is necessary to consider the statutorily required hazards to navigation. These hazards include dams, spillways, trestles, power lines, fuel docks, narrow and shallow waters, areas of obstructed vision, designated swim areas, congested areas with high traffic, and public boat access areas. A history of boating collisions and other incidents should also be considered. If a substantial risk of hazard does exist, it must be decided if the risk of hazard justifies limiting the restriction of free movement and transportation upon waters of this state.

When considering the proposed no wake zone in Brice's Creek, the known hazards do justify the creation of a no wake zone. Traffic density in Brice's Creek is light on weekdays and light to medium on weekends and holidays. However, within the proposed area of the no wake zone, there are several public safety and navigational hazards. There is a bridge with only around 50 feet between the piers. A power line is just south of the bridge and hangs only about two feet above the bottom of the bridge. There are two bends in the creek that are around 90 degrees. Additionally, there is a fueling dock and a public boat ramp/dock. Note that this boat ramp gets limited use. The proposed no wake zone is approximately 450 feet at its widest point and approximately 280 feet at it's narrowest point. The length of the proposed no wake zone is approximately 1,370 feet. At no wake speed, it takes approximately four minutes to travel the full distance of the proposed no wake zone. The water depth in Brice's Creek is generally not an issue.

I am aware of one known complaint/incident in recent years that occurred in the area of the proposed no wake zone. Regarding this incident, there was an occupied canoe underneath the Brice's Creek Road bridge that was swamped and pushed into one of the piers of the bridge by a large vessel. The canoe was damaged but not to the degree that it was considered a reportable boating incident. There were no injuries as a result of this incident however I did charge the operator of the large vessel with operating in a reckless or negligent manner. If the large vessel was traveling at no wake speed, it is likely that this incident would not have occurred.

In conclusion, I do recommend the creation of a no wake in the proposed area of Brice's Creek as the known risks justify limiting the speed of vessels within the area.



Proposed Permanent Amendments to Needmore Game Land Rule Deer Season Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

The antlerless deer harvest during the introductory gun season is limited by 15A NCAC 10D .0251(b) on Nantahala Game Land solely to that portion which is located in Transylvania County. The majority of Nantahala Game Land is outside of Transylvania County and will not have an antlered or antlerless gun season. This proposal will standardize the antlered or antlerless blackpowder and gun seasons between Needmore and Nantahala Game Land. This is particularly important as both game lands have a shared boundary. If the Nantahala Game Land had a more conservative antlered or antlerless season than Needmore, the additional hunting pressure could result in negative impacts to resources and game land use during that period.

This proposal will remove the one day of introductory antlerless deer harvest during the gun season on the Needmore Game Land in Macon and Swain County and will align Needmore Game Land with the same antlerless deer season structure as Nantahala Game Land in Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Jackson, Macon, and Swain counties.

8	(b) Trespass. Er	ntry on game lands for purposes other than hunting, trapping, or fishing shall be as authorized by the
9	landowner. The	Wildlife Resources Commission has identified the following areas on game lands that have additional
10	restrictions on en	ntry or usage:
11	(1)	Archery Zone. On portions of game lands posted as "Archery Zones" hunting is limited to archery
12		equipment and falconry. During the open deer seasons for these areas, antlered and antlerless deer
13		may be taken.
14	(2)	Safety Zone. On portions of game lands posted as "Safety Zones" hunting is prohibited. No person
15		shall hunt or discharge a firearm or bow and arrow within, into, or across a posted safety zone on a

21		Commission. The Commission may authorize entry when the primary purpose for the Restricted
22		Zone shall not be compromised and the persons requesting entry demonstrate a valid need, or official
23		business of the Commission is being conducted by a contractor or agent of the Commission. Valid
24		needs may include access to private property, scientific investigations, surveys, or other access to
25		conduct activities in the public interest.
26	(5)	Temporary Restricted Zone. Portions of game lands posted as "Temporary Restricted Zones" are
27		closed to use by the public, and entry is prohibited without written approval from the Wildlife
28		Resources Commission. An area of a game land shall be declared a Temporary Restricted Zone
29		when there is a danger to the health or welfare of the public.
30	(6)	Scouting-only Zone. On portions of the game lands posted as "Scouting-only Zones" the discharge
31		of firearms or bow and arrow is prohibited.
32	(7)	Restricted Deer Hunting Zone. On portions of game lands posted as "Restricted Deer Hunting
33		Zones" the use of dogs for taking deer is prohibited, except as allowed by permit as provided in G.S.
34		113-264(d).
35	(8)	Day Use Only Zone. On portions of game lands posted as "Day Use Only Zones" the use by the
36		public shall be prohibited from sunset to sunrise.

- 1 (9) Sensitive Habitat Zone. Portions of game lands posted as "Sensitive Habitat Zones" are closed to 2 use by the public during the dates specified on the sign, and entry is prohibited without written 3 approval from the Wildlife Resources Commission by calling 919-707-0150 and requesting a 4 permit.
- 5 The Commission shall conduct a public input meeting in the area where the game land is located before establishing 6 the following zones: archery, restricted firearms, restricted deer hunting, day use only, or sensitive habitat. After the 7 input meeting, the public comments shall be presented at an official Commission meeting for final determination.

8 (c) Littering. No person shall deposit litter, trash, garbage, or other refuse on any game land except in receptacles
9 provided for disposal of refuse at designated camping and target-shooting areas. No garbage dumps or sanitary
10 landfills shall be established on a game land by a person, firm, corporation, county, or municipality, except as
11 permitted by the landowner.

12 (d) Use of weapons. No person shall discharge:

- 13 (1) a weapon within 150 yards of a game land building or designated game land camping area, except
 14 where posted otherwise;
- 15(2)a weapon within 150 yards of a residence located on or adjacent to game lands, except on Butner-16Falls of Neuse and Jordan game lands; and
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a firearm within 150 yards of a residence located on or adjacent to Butner-Falls of Neuse and Jordan Game Lands.

19 No person shall hunt with or have in possession a shotgun shell containing lead or toxic shot while hunting on a posted 20 waterfowl impoundment on a game land, except shotgun shells containing lead buckshot may be used while deer 21 hunting. Individuals carrying a concealed handgun shall adhere to the requirements set forth in G.S. 14-415.11, even 22 if the state issuing the concealed handgun permit is not North Carolina. On Butner-Falls of Neuse, Jordan, Kerr Scott, 23 and Vance game lands, no person shall possess loaded firearms, ammunition, bows and arrows, crossbows, or other 24 weapons except as provided in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 36, Chapter III, Part 327.13, which is 25 incorporated by reference, including subsequent amendments and editions. This document may be accessed at 26 www.ecfr.gov at no cost. On Buckhorn, Chatham, Harris, Hyco, Lee, Mayo, and Sutton Lake game lands; Pee Dee 27 River Game Land north of U.S. 74; and that portion of R. Wayne Bailey- Caswell Game Land that is located north of 28 U.S. 158 and east of N.C. 119, no person shall possess a firearm during closed hunting seasons or closed hunting days 29 for game birds or game animals, except under the following conditions: 30 (1)the firearm is a .22 caliber pistol with a barrel not greater than seven and one-half inches in length

- 31 and shooting only short, long, or long rifle ammunition carried as a side arm;
- 32 (2) the firearm is cased or not immediately available for use;
- 33 (3) the firearm is used by persons participating in field trials on field trial areas; or
- 34 (4) the firearm is possessed in designated camping areas for defense of persons and property.
- 35 (e) Game Lands License: Hunting and Trapping

- (1) Except as provided in Subparagraph (4) of this Paragraph, a person entering a game land to hunt,
 trap, run dogs, or train dogs using wildlife shall have in his or her possession a valid North Carolina
 hunting or trapping license.
- 4 (2) For Commission-sanctioned field trials, active participants, as defined in 15A NCAC 10B .0114, in
 5 a field trial using wildlife shall possess a North Carolina hunting license, except non-residents may
 6 substitute hunting licenses from their state(s) of residence.

For other field trials using wildlife occurring on game lands, judges and active participants shall

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(B) on the game lands described in Rule .0103 (j)(1) of this Section, the game lands license is required for hunting doves; other activities are subject to the control of the landowners.

14 (f) Field Trials and Training Dogs. An individual or organization sponsoring a field trial on the Sandhills Field Trial 15 area shall file an application with the Commission to use the area with the facility use fee computed at the rate of three 16 hundred dollars (\$300.00) for each scheduled day of the trial. The total facility use fee shall cover the period from 17 12:00 noon of the day preceding the first scheduled day of the trial to 10:00 a.m. of the day following the last scheduled 18 day of the trial. The facility use fee shall be paid for all intermediate days on which trials are not run but the building 19 or facilities are used or occupied. A fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day shall be charged to sporting, 20 educational, or scouting groups for scheduled events utilizing the club house only. No person or group of persons or 21 other entity shall enter or use the physical facilities located on the Sandhills Field Trial area or the Laurinburg Fox 22 Trial facility without written approval from an authorized agent of the Wildlife Resources Commission, and no entry 23 or use of a facility shall exceed the scope of or continue beyond the approved use. The Sandhills Field Trial facilities 24 shall be used only for field trials scheduled with the approval of the Wildlife Resources Commission. No more than 25 20 days of field trials may be scheduled for occurrence on the Sandhills facilities during a calendar month, and no 26 more than five days may be scheduled during a calendar week. A field trial requiring more than five days may be 27 scheduled during one week with reduction of the maximum number of days allowable during some other week so that 28 the monthly maximum of 20 days is not exceeded. Before October 1 of each year, the North Carolina Field Trial 29 Association or other organization desiring use of the Sandhills facilities between the Wednesday on or nearest October 30 18 and the second Friday before Thanksgiving and between the first Monday following Thanksgiving and March 31 31 shall submit its proposed schedule of use to the Wildlife Resources Commission for consideration and approval. The 32 use of the Sandhills Field Trial facilities by individuals for training dogs is prohibited; elsewhere on the Sandhills 33 Game Lands dogs may be trained only on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays from October 1 through April 1. 34 Dogs may not be trained or permitted to run unleashed from April 1 through August 15 on game lands located west 35 of I-95, except when participating in field trials sanctioned by the Wildlife Resources Commission. Dogs may not be 36 trained or permitted to run unleashed from March 15 through June 15 on game lands located east of I-95, except when 37 participating in field trials sanctioned by the Wildlife Resources Commission. Additionally, on game lands located west of I-95 where special hunts are scheduled for sportsmen participating in the Disabled Sportsman Program, dogs may not be trained or allowed to run unleashed during legal big game hunting hours on the dates of the special hunts. A field trial shall be authorized when the field trial does not conflict with other planned activities on the game land or field trial facilities, and the applying organization demonstrates their experience and expertise in conducting genuine field trial activities. Entry to physical facilities, other than by field trial organizations under permit, shall be granted when they do not conflict with other planned activities previously approved by the Commission and they do not

7 conflict with the mission of the agency.

(g) Trapping. Subject to the restrictions contained in 15A NCAC 10B .0300, trapping of furbearing animals, armadillos, coyotes, and groundhogs is permitted on game lands during the open trapping seasons for those areas, established by rule. Foxes may be trapped on game lands from October 1 through the end of February in a county with an open fox trapping season that falls between October 1 and the end of February. Foxes may not be taken by trapping on game lands in counties with a closed fox trapping season or during a fox trapping season that occurs outside the dates of October 1 through the end of February. Additionally, fox trapping is allowed on game lands in Clay, Graham, Henderson, Macon, and Tyrrell counties with a daily bag limit of two and a season bag limit of 10 from the first to the

- 15 fourth Saturday in January. Trapping is prohibited:
- 16 (1) on the J Robert Gordon Field Trial Area of Sandhills Game Land;
- 17 (2) in posted "safety zones" located on a game land;
- 18 (3) by the use of bait on the National Forest Lands bounded by the Blue Ridge Parkway on the south,
 19 US 276 on the north and east, and NC 215 on the west;

20 (4) on the DuPont State Forest Game Lands; and

21 (5) from April 1 through September 31.

At a trap, trappers may use a single bait site of grain, fruit, or other foods when trapping if the food is not a processed food product as defined in G.S. 113-294(r), is less than 3 cubic inches and is covered to prevent it from being seen from above. Feathers, including those with attached skin or entire bird wings, hair with or without skin or hide, and bones that include no attached meat, organs, or viscera do not need to be covered.

(h) Vehicular Traffic. No person shall drive a motorized vehicle on a game land except on roads constructed,
 maintained, and opened for vehicular travel and on trails posted for vehicular travel, unless the person:

- (1) is driving in the vehicle gallery of a scheduled bird dog field trial held on the Sandhills Game Land;
 or
- is a disabled sportsman as defined in Paragraph (1) of this Rule or holds a Disabled Access Program
 Permit as described in Paragraph (1) of this Rule and is abiding by the rules described in Paragraph
 (k).

33 (i) Camping.

- 34 (1) No person shall camp on a game land except on an area posted by the landowner for camping.
- On game lands owned by the State of North Carolina, where the North Carolina Wildlife Resources
 Commission is the primary custodian, the maximum period of consecutive overnight camping at a
 designated camping area is 14 days within any 30-day period, unless otherwise specified in rules of

this Subchapter. After 14 consecutive days of camping, personal belongings shall be removed from the game land.

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(3) A hunting, fishing, trapping or Game Lands License is required for individuals age 16 or older to camp on game lands in areas posted for camping except when camping within 100 yards of the Roanoke River on the state-owned portion of the Roanoke River Wetlands Game Land, within 100 yards of the Neuse River on that portion of the game land west of NC-43, and in posted areas along the Mountains-to-Sea Trail on Butner-Falls of Neuse Game Land.

(j) Release of Animals and Fish. It is unlawful to release pen-raised animals or birds, wild animals or birds, domesticated animals, except hunting dogs and raptors where otherwise permitted for hunting or training purposes, or feral animals, or hatchery-raised fish on game lands without written authorization. It is unlawful to move wild fish from one stream to another on game lands without written authorization. Written authorization shall be given when release of animals is determined by a Wildlife Resources Commission biologist not to be harmful to native wildlife in the area and is in the public interest or advance the programs and goals of the Wildlife Resources Commission.

(k) Non-Highway Licensed Vehicles. It is unlawful to operate motorized land vehicles not licensed for highway use
on game lands except for designated areas on National Forests. Disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (1) of this
Rule and people who have obtained a Disabled Access Program permit are exempt from this restriction but shall
comply with the terms of their permit. Furthermore, disabled persons, as defined under the federal Americans with
Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 126) may use wheelchairs or other all-terrain wheelchairs on areas where foot travel is
allowed. Off road vehicles including ATVs, UTVs, and ebikes are not permitted.

20 (1) Disabled Access Program. Disabled individuals who meet the requirements of G.S. 113-296 may obtain a Disabled 21 Access Permit and Disabled Sportsman Hunt Certification online at newildlife.org. The Disabled Access Permit allows 22 individuals to operate electric wheel chairs, all-terrain vehicles, and other passenger vehicles on any Commission-23 maintained road open for vehicular travel and those trails posted for vehicular travel and ungated or open-gated roads 24 otherwise closed to vehicular traffic on game lands owned by the Wildlife Resources Commission and on game lands 25 whose owners have agreed to that use. Those game lands, or parts thereof, where this Paragraph applies are designated 26 online, at www.ncwildlife.org. This Paragraph does not permit vehicular access on fields, openings, roads, paths, or 27 trails planted for wildlife food or cover. One companion, who is identified by a companion card issued to each qualified 28 disabled person, may accompany a disabled person to provide assistance, provided the companion is constantly in 29 visual or verbal contact with the disabled person. The companion may participate in lawful activities while assisting 30 a disabled person, provided license requirements are met. A vehicle used by a qualified disabled person for access to 31 game lands under this provision shall have the Disabled Access Permit available for inspection by wildlife 32 enforcement officers upon request. Hunters who qualify under the Disabled Sportsman Program and their companions 33 may access special hunting blinds for people with disabilities during regularly scheduled, non-permit hunting days on 34 a first come basis, except for those blinds located on the Restricted Area of Caswell Game Land. It is unlawful for 35 anyone other than disabled persons holding a Disabled Access Permit, during waterfowl season, to hunt within 100 36 yards of a waterfowl blind designated by the Wildlife Resources Commission as a Disabled Sportsman's hunting blind.

1 The Disabled Sportsman Hunt Certification allows individuals to apply for available Disabled sportsman permit 2 hunting opportunities as prescribed in G.S. 113-296.

3 (m) Public nudity. Public nudity, including nude sunbathing, is prohibited on game lands, including land or water.

4 For the purposes of this Section, "public nudity" means a person's intentional failure to cover with a fully opaque

5 covering the person's genitals, pubic area, anal area, or female breasts below a point from the top of the areola while 6 in a public place.

7 (n) Shooting Ranges. On public shooting ranges managed by the Commission, no person shall use designated shooting 8 ranges for purposes other than for firearm or bow and arrow marksmanship, development of shooting skills, or for 9 other safe uses of firearms and archery equipment. Other uses, including camping, building fires, operating 10 concessions or other activities not directly involved with recreational or competitive shooting are prohibited, unless 11 written authorization is obtained from the Commission. No person, when using any shooting range, shall deposit 12 debris or refuse on the grounds of the range. This includes items used as targets, except that clay targets broken on the 13 range, by the shooter, may be left on the grounds where they fall. No person shall shoot items made of glass on the 14 grounds of the range. No person may leave a vehicle or other obstruction in a location or position that it will prevent, 15 impede, or inconvenience the use by other persons of any shooting range. No person shall leave a vehicle or other 16 object parked in a place on the shooting range other than the place or zone that is designated and posted or marked as 17 an authorized parking zone. No person shall handle firearms or bow and arrow on a shooting range in a careless or 18 reckless manner. No person shall intentionally shoot into any target holder, post, or other permanent fixture or structure 19 while using a shooting range. No person shall shoot a firearm in a manner that would cause rifled or smoothbore 20 projectiles to travel off of the range, except that shotgun shot, size No. 4 or smaller may be allowed to travel from the 21 range if it presents no risk of harm or injury to a person. Persons using a shooting range shall obey posted range safety 22 rules and those persons who violate range safety rules or create a public safety hazard shall leave the shooting range 23 if directed to by law enforcement officers or to leave by Commission employees. No person shall handle firearms on 24 a shooting range while under the influence of an impairing substance. The consumption of alcohol or alcoholic 25 beverages on a shooting range is prohibited. Open days and hours of operation shall be designated on signs and at 26 least one sign shall be posted at the entrance to each shooting range. No person, when using a shooting range, shall do 27 an act that is prohibited or neglect to do an act that is required by signs or markings placed on the area under authority 28 of this Rule for regulating the use of the area.

29 (o) Limited-access Roads. During the months of June, July, and August, roads posted as "Limited-access Roads" are 30 open to motorized vehicles from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. These roads shall be posted with the opening and closing 31 times.

32 (p) No person shall attempt to obscure the sex or age of a bird or animal taken by severing the head or any other part 33 thereof, or possess a bird or animal that has been so mutilated.

34 (q) Baiting. Except as provided in Paragraph (g) of this Rule, no person shall place, or cause to be placed on a game

35 land, salt, grain, fruit, or other foods without written authorization from an agent of the Commission. Written

36 authorization may be provided for Commission authorized projects or Commission contractors to meet specific objectives. Except as authorized by rule, no person shall take or attempt to take wild birds or wild animals attracted to
 these foods.

Proposed Temporary Amendments to 10F .0307 – Catawba, Iredell, Lincoln, and Mecklenburg Counties Recommended by Agency Staff for Public Notice, Comment, and Presentation at Public Hearing

Wildlife Resources Commission staff were recently notified of safety concerns and enforcement challenges surrounding vessel liveries on Lake Norman. Despite the ability of the Lake Norman Marine Commission to establish regulations concerning public recreation and water safety, enforcement of those regulations without joint resolution, as required by S.L.1969-1089, of the four enforcement entities patrolling the lake, or regulations codified in Rule, has made it difficult to enact and enforce regulations, leading to lack of action against liveries and increased safety concerns among lake users.

Codifying vessel livery safety requirements in Rule will clarify standards for livery companies, facilitate and streamline enforcement activities, and improve public safety.

15A NCAC 10F .0307 CATAWBA, IREDELL, LINCOLN, AND MECKLENBURG COUNTIES

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15A NCAC 10F .0307 CATAWBA, IREDELL, LINCOLN, AND MECKLENBURG COUNTIES

- 2 (a) Regulated Area. This Rule shall apply to Lake Norman in Catawba, Iredell, Lincoln, and Mecklenburg counties:
- 3 (1) within 50 yards of the shoreline at Jetton Park in Mecklenburg County, from a point on the west side of 4 the park at 35.47082 N, 80.90427 W, south and around the point at 35.46703 N, 80.90360 W, then 5 northeast to a point at 35.47262 N, 80.89727 W;
- 6 (2) Bluff Point Cove in Cornelius shore to shore, east of a line from a point 50 yards west of the south shore 7 of the cove mouth at 35.45327 N, 80.89520 W to a point 50 yards west of the north shore of the cove 8 mouth at 35.45487 N, 80.89440 W; and
- 9 (3) the cove immediately north of the inlet of Hager Creek in Iredell County, north of a line from a point on 10 the north shore at 35.55760 N, 80.94730 W southwest to a point on the island at the inlet of Hager Creek 11 at 35.55695 N, 80.94971 W, and east of a line from the same point on the island northwest to a point on 12 the north shore at 35.55754 N, 80.95029 W.

13 (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no wake speed within the regulated areas described in

14 Paragraph (a) of this Rule and as set forth in G.S. 75A-14.1.

15 (c) Swimming Areas. No person operating or responsible for the operation of a vessel shall permit it to enter any marked

- 16 swimming area on the waters of Lake Norman.
- 17 (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Lake Norman Marine Commission shall be the designated agency for
- 18 placement and maintenance of navigational aids and regulatory markers on the waters of Lake Norman.
- 19 (e) Vessel Liveries. Vessel liveries operating on Lake Norman shall conduct the following activities with each vessel renter

20 prior to relinquishing control of the vessel:

- 21 a pre-rental vessel inspection to ensure that safety equipment required by Rule 10F .0201 is on board and (1) 22 accessible; and
- 23 (2)provide and review instruction on safe operation of the vessel rented including review of navigation rules 24 in G.S. 75A-6.1, operating restrictions in G.S. 75A-10, an electronic or waterproof navigational map of 25
- Lake Norman, and the U.S. Coast Guard's U.S. Aids to Navigation System pamphlet.
- 26 Documentation of adherence to these requirements shall be signed by both parties and be available for inspection by law
- 27 enforcement officers upon request from the livery company for up to two years and from the vessel renter while that
- 28 individual is in control of the vessel.
